Credit hour: A unit of measurerepresenting an hour (50 minutes) of instruction

Grade-point average (academidtigh schoolGPA): The sum of gradepoints a student has arnedn secondary school with the number of course taken. The most common system of assigning numbers of gradescounts four points for A, three points for B, two points for a C, one point for a D, and no points for F. Unweighted GPA's assign the same weight to each course. Weighting

gives students additional points for their grades in advanced or honors courses.

Graduate student: A student who holds a bachelor's or equivalent, and is taking courses at the post-baccalaureate level.

*Health services: Free or low cost on-campus primary and preventive health care available to students.

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At Least 2 But Less Than 4 Academic Years: Requirescompletion of an organized program of studyat the postsecond any evel (below the baccalaureate degreine) at least 2 but less than 4 full-time equivalent academic years of designed for completion in at least 60 but less than 120 credit hours, or in at least 1,800 but less than 3,600 clock hours.

Private institution: An educationalnstitution controlled by aprivate individual(s) or by a nongovernmentagency usually supported primarily by other than public funds, and operated by other than publicly elected or appointed officials.

Private for-profit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agencyin control receives compensation, other than wages, rent, or other expenses for the assumption of risk.

Private nonprofit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agencyin control receives no compensation, other than wages, rent, or other expenses for the assumption is the include both independent nonprofit schools and the individual with a religious organization.

Proprietary institution: See Private for-profit institution.

Public institution: An educationalinstitution whose programs analctivities are operatedby publicly electedor appointed school officials, and which is supported primarily by public funds.

Quarter calendar system: A calendar system which the academic year onsists of three essions called quarters of about 120 eeks each. The range may be from 10 to 15 weeks. There may be an additional quarter in the summer.

Race/ethnicity: Categoryusedto describe groupso which individuals belong, identify with, or belong in the eyesof the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. A person may be counted in only one group.

Race/ethnicity unknown: Categoryusedto classify students or employees whose race/ethnicity is not known and whom institutions are unable to place in one of the specified racial/ethnic categories.

RecognizedPostsecondaryCredential: Includes bothTitle IV eligible degrees, certificatesand otherrecognizedpostsecondary credentialsAny credentialthat is received aftercompletion a program thats eligible for Title IV federalstudentaid. Credentials that are awardedo recognize arindividual's attainmentof measurable technicair industry/occupationaskills necessaryto obtain employmentor advancewithin an industry occupation(Generally based n standards developed or endorsedebyployersor industry associations).

Unit: a standard of measurement representing hours of academic instruction (e.g., semester credit, quarter credit, clock hour). Undergraduate: A studentenrolled ina four- orfive-yearbachelor'sdegreeprogram, an associate degreeogram, or a vocational or technical program below the baccalaureate.

*Veteran's counseling: Helps veteransand their dependents obtain benefits for every first and provides ertifications to the Veteran's Administration. May also provide personal counseling on the transition from the military to a civilian life.

*Visually impaired: Any person whose ight loss is not correctableand is sufficiently severe as adversely affecteducational performance.

Volunteer work (as admissionfactor): Specialconsideratiorgiven to students foractivity done on a volunted vasis(e.g., tutoring, hospital care, working with the elderly or disabled) as a service to the community or the public in general.

Wait list: List of students who meet the admission requirements but will only be offered a place in the classif space becomes available.

Weekend college: A program that allows students to take a complete course of study and attend classes only on weekends.

White: A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

*Women's center: Centerwith programs academicactivities, and/orservicesintendedto promotean understanding of thevolving roles of women.

Work experience (as admissionfactor): Special consideration given to students who have been employed prior to application, whether for relevance to major, demonstration of employment-related skills, or as explanation of student's academic and extracurricular record.

Financial Aid Definitions

External scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants received from outside (private) sources that students bring with them (e.g., Kiwanis, National Merit scholarships). The stitution mayprocess paperworlo receive the dollars, but it has norole in determining the recipient or the dollar amount awarded.

Financial aid applicant: Any applicantwho submitsany one of the institutionally required financial aid applications/forms, such the FAFSA.

Indebtedness:Aggregatedollar amount borrowed through arlgan program(federal, statesubsidized, unsubsidized/rivate, etc.; excluding parent loans/while the studentwas enrolledat an institution. Student loans co-signed by a parent assumed be the responsibility of the student and should included.

Institutional scholarships and grants: Endowed scholarships, annugits and tuition funded grants for which the institution determines the recipient.
