Attendance

When you log onto zoom, the first thing you should do is say something (such as "hello") in the chat pod. Searching the chat pod for names after class is the easiest way for me to take attendance. I encourage you to change your id to your first & last name, if it shows up as your LSU email. If for some reason you want to use an id that is neither your first & last name nor your LSU email, that's fine; just email me and let me know what you are using, so that I can find it when recording attendance.

You should also say "bye" when leaving class—and full credit is given for doing both.

You have up to three unexcused and three excused absences (excused means you've notified me in advance.)

In our "zoom" class, as we start covering the subject matter (i.e., next week), I'll sometimes ask questions that are designed to review material we've covered.

There is extra credit for participation.

<u>Quizzes</u>

You can find the quiz for each topic with the rest of that topic's material. Students usually have 4-7 days to complete. Quizzes consist of 5-25 multiple choice questions. You have two tries; the highest grade is the one that counts. After the first try, you should be able to see feedback on some of the questions, which should help you figure out the correct answer. Usually I'll set it so that you know which questions you got wrong.
