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In an increasingly multicultural and media-saturated society, we wrestle with understandings of gender and sexuality shaped by pop culture. This course's primary question is, how do we construct gender and sexuality through pop culture? Secondary questions include, how are gender and sexuality racialized? And what methods are available for the study of pop culture? The course is organized according to the chronological development of media (literature, film, television, and new media) to underscore sociohistorical changes and technological advancements, culminating in attention to social media platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, Grindr, Instagram, TikTok, and YouTube. The readings alternate between feminist and queer theoretical frameworks. In class, we will relate the readings to audiovisual excerpts through a discussion-based seminar format.
