Manyhazardous materials may be present in your own ho**Aree** osolcans, cleaners, bleach, used oils, paint, batteries, fluorescent tubes, TVs, tires and propane tanks are just a few common examples. When it comes time to dispose of these, it's important to remember that they shouldn't be thrown away or poured down the drain. The city of Baton Rouge hos**tarbi**ual hazardous waste collection days, and some of these wastes can even be handled for free y**ear**and through local businesses. City collection days usually occur in March and Octobeat Memorial Stadium.

Many government environmental agencies consider a substance hazardous if it can catch fire, if it can react or explode when mixed with other substances, if it is corrosive, or if it is toxic. These materials can be harmful to people and the environment when swallowed, absorbed, or inhaled.
